SIGHS OF AN OUTERDOSE

The following are signs of an opioid overdose:

- Unconsciousness or difficulty waking from sleep.
- Discoloration of lips or fingernails.
- Skin discoloration.
- Extreme confusion or paranoia.
- Abnormally low or high body temperature.
- Abnormally fast or slow breathing.
- Abnormally fast or slow heart rate.
- Vomiting.



If someone is showing signs of an overdose, administer naloxone and call 911.

With naloxone, you can save a life from an opioid overdose.
